Donations Needed for Pursonalities Plus

Beaders, do you have gently used jewelry items you no longer use or care to store? Consider donating to Pursonalities Plus ABQ.

Do you long to make earrings or bracelets but feel you "should" do something else because you have too much? Satisfy your creative urge and share with others who could greatly benefit.

For those unfamiliar with Pursonalities Plus ABQ, the idea began with two ladies gifting 50 gently used purses fill with new toiletries to three organizations. In 7 years, the movement has grown to a cadre of dedicated volunteers filling more than 2,000 purses for 26 different charitable organizations.

In early summer 2023, Pursonalities Plus ABQ gained 501(c)3 status. The intention is that the organization continue to grow and serve primarily women who are victims of domestic violence or sex trafficking.

Since 2017, Pursonalities Plus ABQ has included a cellophane packet of gently used jewelry – a curated set of necklace, bracelet, and earrings – in each purse. Sometimes these jewelry items are the only personal items a recipient owns.

Although donations have been generous, Pursonalities Plus ABQ is seriously in need of earrings and bracelets at this time. If you can see your way to making some for this good cause, it would be greatly appreciated.

This award is to honor former Bead Society of New Mexico member Kenny Halstead, his creativity in beadwork and mixed media, and his encouragement to other members to enter their work in the Jewelry-Beadwork competition at the New Mexico State Fair.

The Claire Sweeney Encouragement award is given to the beadwork, jewelry, or mixed media piece in the Pre-Teen, Teen, or Beginner Section of the New Mexico State Fair Jewelry-Beadwork division to encourage their further development in beading. This award is to honor former Bead Society of New Mexico member Claire Sweeney, her creativity in beadwork, and her willingness to teach others about beading and encourage their efforts.

Fall Colors 2023 Bead Challenge

The colors of fall may be bright (such as the red, orange, and yellow leaves on trees) or muted (such as the browns, greys, and deep purples of the forest as it gets ready for winter). Choose a color palette that illustrates your vision of fall colors and create a beaded object (jewelry or non-jewelry). There is no kit for this challenge.

Rules:

- 1. All submissions must be completed by you prior to the October 17, 2023 BSNM general meeting (and made after the October 2022 general meeting).
- You may create a piece/set of jewelry (such as necklace, earrings, and/or bracelet) or a non-jewelry/mixed-media item (such as a decorated pumpkin, figurine, box, or wall hanging) for this challenge. (Only one entry in one category per person.)
- **3.** At least 25% of the finished project must be beads and/or jewelry elements (beads; cabochons; rhinestones; chain; old earrings, pendants, charms; etc.) incorporated into the design.
- **4.** You may add any elements such as paint, decoupage, and/or found objects you need to complete your project.
- 5. Your finished project must be brought to the October 2023 general meeting where members will vote and prizes will be awarded. There will be two categories for entries: jewelry and non-jewelry.
- 6. Judging will be based on creativity in presentation and materials, and mastery in craftsmanship. Judging will also be based in part on how closely the entries followed the rules. Prizes will be awarded!

Happy beading and good luck with the challenge! Try to use this challenge to broaden your beading horizons. Learn something new or try something different!

GASP! Miyuki is Discontinuing 75 Delica Colors!

There's never a dull moment in the bead biz! Last week the news made its way to me that Miyuki is discontinuing some colors across their bead lineup, including **75 Delicas**.

This guidance comes from Caravan Beads:

Miyuki has discontinued colors that had trace amounts of lead in the finish and will be producing only beads that do not contain lead going forward.

So should you be concerned about your beads?

I did research on lead toxicity, and the two main ways lead poses a danger are when it is ingested, and when it is inhaled. So basically, unless you're eating the beads, or smashing them and inhaling the dust, you're fine. The trace lead exposure danger is likely in the production of the beads for their employees. Please note this is my understanding of lead transfer, and not any official information.

I created a PDF file of all the colors and types of beads that Miyuki is discontinuing, and it's available to download on my **Free Patterns page**.

In the meantime, I stocked up on the discontinued Delica colors. You can find all the discontinued colors **here**.

I will continue to stock the discontinued colors as long as my suppliers have stock available, with the exception of the discontinued silk satin Delicas. I am removing those from our site when they sell out.

The Nature of Glass Exhibit

New Mexico Museum of Art, 107 W. Palace Ave., Santa Fe through December 31, 2023

"The Nature of Glass" exhibit focuses on 28 contemporary works by such household names as Judy Chicago, Georgia O'Keefe, and Preston Singletary, as well as William Morris, Robert Wilson, and Tony Jojola.

The featured techniques include blown, hot-wired, etched, assemblage, sand carved, cast, kiln-formed, stained, and more. Most of the works reflect nature or the environment via images of flora and fauna, as well as the human body, said curator Christian Waguespack.

"This looks at how [artists] brought nature into their work through the representation of flowers, animals, the body, space, science, and the environment," Waguespack said. "It's pretty broad."

Glass has been used as an artistic medium for thousands of years and remains one of the world's most prevalent art forms.

"Glass is becoming more and more popular in New Mexico," Waguespack said. "We've got several glass studios in Santa Fe. Even [famed glass artist Dale] Chihuly taught at the Institute of Indian Arts and Culture. It's definitely got a presence here and a big, strong following."

Owner of New Mexico's Mama's Minerals Shares Life Lessons from Unique Business

Laura Randolph never wanted to be a businesswoman, and she certainly did not want to own a store - let alone two in two separate cities. She also had zero interest in "minerals, rocks and fossils, and definitely not beads and jewelry-making." Nonetheless, she has been immersed in all of the above during her long tenure as owner of Mama's Minerals Inc., which sells everything from Pakistani marlestone plates to crystals, fossils, and beads. Although Randolph is retiring, she will continue to own the business that she started in 1986 out of the back of her pickup truck. "I had an easy life, driving around in that little truck," she says. "I never envisioned doing the same thing my entire life." Randolph had been teaching English courses at Laguna-Acoma High School, when a friend took her crystal digging in Arkansas. The friend gave her collection away, but Randolph decided to sell hers. "Why the hell did I start to sell them? I have no idea," she says. "Even at the time, I'm not sure I could have told you. It's just following my nose, or doors opening, and I walk through them." The opening doors led to a variety of storefronts in Albuquerque and one in Santa Fe, which closed in 2020 after 25 years in business. Mama's Minerals has operated at a number of Albuquerque locations over the years, and will begin moving this week from its current spot in the Sawmill district to Avanyu Plaza near the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center. Mama's Minerals (named both for a friend and for "Mother Earth") "definitely could have

grown into a national presence," Randolph says. "But I didn't want to because I never wanted to be a business person in the first place," she says.

What have you liked best about running Mama's Minerals?

"I loved going to the shows and purchasing inventory. There are three big shows, still, in Tucson, Quartzite, (Arizona) and Denver. I started (buying) with \$500 left from my mother's inheritance."

What are your favorites among your inventory?

"For me, personally, I'm always fascinated by the fossils. Heather (Larson), our COO (chief operating officer) found dinosaur footprints. The fossils are just amazing to me, but they don't get as much play with customers as the shiny amethyst — or anything that's polished and dyed. And meteorites are very, very cool. We have meteoritic material from around the world."

You are stepping down but not selling the business. Why is that?

"Usually when people sell these small businesses, within a year they're closed. People who buy businesses generally think it's going to be fun, so however far in — and definitely by the end of a year they'll say, 'Forget this.' It takes so much time and effort, (and) they just didn't realize that. So if I sold it, yeah, I'd get the money, but it would close. I'd lose my legacy, and everything I built would be gone. So if you can find someone to run it or buy it from you and keep running it — I have Heather (Larson). Heather is like my family. Her son is my godson. What would I do with the money if I sold it? I don't have any children or anybody to leave it to except them."

Did you ever regret this career that you never planned on?

"No. I got very tired, though. I tried to take a break from the business twice — not close it, but take some time off and work less. I trained Heather to take over for me so I could take off for a while. Later on, I got my second wind, and then I needed another break, and I got my third wind, and now I'm just old."

What's been the hardest part?

"Employees. Do you hear that over and over? Not that the employees are bad. The employees build the business. They are the business. You can't live without them. But you're dealing with human personalities. Just like in a family or a couple or any group, any time you deal with human beings, you get this stuff going on. So that can be difficult."

What makes you laugh?

"What we do as humans. It's so weird and funny. What makes me happy or joyous, it's just humanity. The goodness of people. I'm not saying the goodness of people in spite of all this (or that), because it's all one. If it's road rage or you're just being mean or whatever, it's all part of the opposite of that. Really, I don't know about this world. It's so, so, so tremendously beautiful, and then there are horrible, unspeakable things. But it's all there together."

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How do you spend your free time?

"My biggest thing is I love being with people, so spending time with friends. And snowshoeing. A friend took me, and now I'm a total snowshoe addict. I don't like hiking. Walking for pleasure? You walk to get someplace. But snowshoeing is completely different. First of all, I stand up straighter, but also you're in a snowy wonderland. It's an adventure."

What has made you successful?

"I turn nos into yeses. When someone or something says no, I always think that it probably can be done, and I set about doing it. I'm driven. I'm not used to losing. I expect to succeed. But I'm perfectly OK if I'm wrong. I'm happy to apologize. I just say, 'Let's try something else.' It doesn't affect my sense of competence."

Focus on Sandia Heights Artist

The Sandia Heights Artists Studio Tour is showcasing some of the artists participating in the tour this year (Saturday, September 9 and Sunday, September 10, 2023).

The next featured artist, Mary Ellen Merrigan is a jeweler who specializes in handmade chain. She appreciates this type of chain because the individuality of each link mirrors how individual we are as people.

Mary Ellen's interest in jewelry began with beads, and she then moved on to making her own findings (clasps, closures, and extenders).

Currently, she concentrates on chain with different shapes, and special embellishments that represent the artist that she's becoming.

She feels that there is huge creative diversity on the SHA Studio Tour (she will be at Stop #1), and is excited to celebrate all the new artists and expansion being experienced for the Tour's 20th Anniversary.

Fordite: A Colorful Gemstone Alternative

Fordite is the beautiful, colorful result of artistic ingenuity. It is made from over-sprayed paint found in old car factories and recycled in place of gemstones in jewelry designs. Cindy Dempsey owns <u>Urban Relic</u> <u>Design</u>, is a passionate collector of fordite, and is an expert on this unique recycled stone substitute. We asked Cindy to tell us all about fordite and its use in jewelry making.

Q: You call fordite an "industrial gemstone." Do you think it contains properties like gemstones?

I call it an industrial gemstone in a playful way because it is made in factories and resembles agate and jasper when it is polished. It is hard to describe what fordite is made from because the finished "stone" does not look like paint that has been created by cutting and polishing cured, layered enamels. My own term, "Motor Agate" is another name I use to help people conceptualize the appearance of the material because it is like types of stone agate, but with a nod to its manmade origin in a factory.





Q: How does fordite "rough" compare to gemstone rough?

When you look at fordite rough, it is obviously not a natural stone. It looks like a lumpy chunk of some

kind of layered material and it softer to cut. But when it is cut in cross section, or the top layer is sliced through to create a window, you can see what colors lie within and it gets exciting! Cutting it is a fun discovery—there are often surprises in there.

Like gemstone or wood, fordite yields different patterns depending on how you cut it. Lumps on the outside yield beautiful orbital patterns. Deeper cuts may reveal stripes. Like gemstone cutting, experience teaches you how to maximize the potential of the type and shape of the rough you have. It is typically easier to polish than natural stone.

Q: How do you know if you have real fordite versus gemstones that have been dyed to have a similar look?

"Real fordite" rough typically has some unifying features: the shape of the rough is rather small, the type of paints or enamels are identifiable to the period, the general uniformity and fineness of the enamel layers, color combinations, and the presence of primer layers. All these factors can indicate hints to the collection period, or sometimes even factory origin.

Q: How rare is true fordite?

True vintage fordite is rare and can be very expensive. It is difficult to source, and keepers of the old stashes are notoriously stingy with their treasure. There are some ambiguous stones on the market that can be mistaken for fordite. One lookalike is rainbow calsilica. This material has similar striped patterns, with other factors. Some of the indicators that it is not authentic fordite are bright colors, thick layers that are not well connected, there are no primer or metallic layers, and it is heavy like stone. Real fordite is very lightweight and polishes well.

Q: What advice would you share with people who want to work with fordite?

Fordite is an ideal focal element for jewelry because it is beautiful, lightweight, durable, and intriguing. Not only is it recycled or "upcycled" from one purpose to another, but it has an interesting story to tell. Let it be the star of your next jewelry creation!

Volunteering with BSNM

Be Gentle: 7 Tips for Caring for Pearls and Pearl Jewelry

Pearls are delicate gemstones that require gentle handling to avoid scratching, chipping, or other forms of damage. There are a few tips for caring for pearls that will help keep them lustrous, from when not to wear them, to how to properly clean and store them. By providing regular maintenance and cautious handling, you can ensure that your pearl jewelry remains stunning and lasts for generations to come.

1: Never wear pearls when exercising. Perspiration can attack them. **Plus, you can't focus on getting a good workout if you're worried about losing your** pearls.

2: Never wear your pearls in a swimming pool. (If **Cleopatra's pearls dissolved in wine, just think what** chlorine can do to them.) They don't like household chemicals, either. Saltwater can be harmful to pearls and may weaken the stringing material.


3: Don't wear pearls if you're doing work where they'll encounter hard surfaces. A bracelet constantly thwacking on a desk or keyboard will harm the pearls. Pearl rings are best for special occasion wear since they are susceptible to scratching or breaking.

4: Put on your pearls after you've applied your makeup, perfume, or other spray. Wipe them with a soft cloth after you take them off to remove oils and other substances that can damage them.

5: Store pearls in a soft cloth bag to protect them from being scratched by the other jewelry in your jewelry box. Do not store your pearls in an airtight plastic bag because it can affect the nacre. Lay pearl jewelry down instead of hanging your strand—the string can stretch.

6: Give pearls a gentle bath, occasionally, if you wear them often. Take this opportunity to inspect them for damaged pearls or knots. Lay them out to dry before storing them. Have them restrung if you notice any stretching or damage or after frequent wear.

7: Knots between pearls protect them from rubbing against each other at the fragile drill hole. Knotting also prevents loss should the strand break. You'll only be scrambling around on the airport floor looking for one pearl, not dozens. Because Murphy's Law says that if your pearl strand is going to break, it'll break at the most inconvenient place and time possible.


"Heart of the Gypsy Book" with Gypsy Pamela Thurs. – Sun., July 13-16, 2023 10:00 am – 5:00 pm each day
