	BSNM member Nan Card will teach this gorgeous stringing project. Join Nan in making this lariat necklace! It is made with a large leaf toggle and 6 strands of size 11 seed beads in your color choices from your stash. If you prefer, you can make the necklace using 4 strands of size 8 seed beads. Nan has a good supply of silver-tone and gold-tone leaf toggles you can buy for \$2 each. The leaf has a small loop at the opposite end from the large loop to attach 6 strands using the same beads you use for the ends of the long strands for double the fun at the bottom of the lariat when you wear it! <b>Class fee:</b> no cost				
	Kit fee: \$2 for leaf toggle Students need to bring: size 11 seed beads (or size 8 seed beads) in coordinating colors – enough to make 6 strands (or 4 strands) at least 24 inches long; sparkling and interesting beads to complement the color of each strand such as bugle beads, twisted bugles, 4mm crystals in any shape, etc.; teardrops or daggers for the bottom of the strands; stringing material (such as FireLine, Beadalon, or SoftFlex); appropriate size needle, if needed; crimps, if needed; scissors or cutters; pliers, if needed; bead mat; beading lamp, if desired; magnifier, if needed. # Czech Glass Beads: The Charm of the Small Factory

I recently received my order of Preciosa<sup>®</sup> Czech glass beads and I'm ready to have some fun! I realize that although I've been using this product for years I never really thought about where the beads actually come from. Are they really made in the Czech Republic or is that just part of the brand name? How and where are they produced?

Since many jewelry artists have these types of questions in the back of their minds, let's "Czech out" the answers as we discover the process behind Preciosa Czech fire-polished beads.

## Are they really from the Czech Republic?

It's not just a name. Czech glass has been famous for over 150 years. Preciosa Czech glass beads are produced entirely in the Czech Republic from various small factories. A landlocked Eastern European country surrounded by Poland, Germany, Austria, and Slovakia, the Czech Republic is well-known in the jewelry-making industry for producing top-quality glass beads. The style of Czech glass beads is also sought after because of the uniform smooth holes that help with stringing.

#### What are the small factories?

Many beaders prefer to work with Czech fire-polished beads because they know the manufacturing process involves and supports individual families. The small factories and villages are a domestic style of subcontracting work. It supports small groups that are working out of factories, community centers, and villages.

One of the biggest benefits to the workers of small factories is that they are able to gain additional income and work very close to home in non-metropolitan villages. This is very helpful to many of the single women who can't find work elsewhere, yet still need to provide for their children and household. This causes the manufacturing process to be distinctive in that the entire line of products isn't produced within the walls of a single factory. For this reason there may be a natural variance in colors, shapes, or sizes.

Since Czech fire-polished beads are manufactured and delivered from multiple locations, the overall process takes longer to produce than a traditional large factory setting. This adds to the timeline for the beads to be created, received by Preciosa, and shipped to Fire Mountain Gems for customer distribution.

# Why do the strands sometimes vary in color?

One of the reasons Czech beads often vary from strand to strand is that they are fired twice at separate locations. Each location may have a different style oven, producing slightly different temperatures, and they aren't all heated for the exact same amount of time. These variances are what can cause the beads and strands to differ.

This is the beauty of Czech glass bead products, they can have a slight variations and an individual quality. It may sound like a cut-and-dried process, but it takes great dedication with a good eye and skilled hand to produce such fascinating beads. Offering a dynamic color change, a softer look with an alluring fire-polish, these beads are highly requested by customers and gratefully provided from our friends in the small factories of the Czech Republic.

# Types of Czech glass beads

Whether molded or lampwork, all glass beads begin as heated glass.

**Fire-polished beads** are molded, faceted, heated again, and then fire-polished to achieve their characteristic sparkle. They can be used as an alternative to crystal.



**Druk beads** are molded, tumbled to remove any mold lines, and heated again to create a smooth bead. Druks are round, solid-color (either opaque or transparent) glass beads.



**Cathedral glass beads** resemble stained glass windows with their facets that reflect the light. After being molded and cleaned, the beads are coated with a metallic finish. Facets are cut into the beads around the center, leaving metallic detailing on the top and bottom of the bead.



**Lampwork glass beads** are individually made by melting glass rods over a flame and depositing the molten glass onto a metal rod. Czech lampwork beads are high quality and consistent in size.

Paper Bead Jewelry: Step-by-Step Instructions for 40+ Designs

# A 50,000-Year-Old Fashion Statement Could Be One of the World's Oldest Social Networks

#### Nearly identical beads carved from ostrich eggshells, found over a large region of Africa, might have been a first in cool trends

Scientists studying ostrich eggshells carved into beads in Africa 50,000 years ago believe they may have been **part of the human species' first social ne**twork, reports Katie Hunt for CNN.

For the past decade, researchers examined some 1,500 ancient beads excavated from 31 sites across eastern and southern sections of Africa and found the artifacts were nearly identical in shape, size and style, per CNN.




Scientists studied more than 1,500 beads made from ostrich egg shells from across 31 sites in Africa, and found that they were nearly identical in shape and size, suggesting an early form of social networking.

Study co-authors Jennifer Miller and Yiming Wang of the Max Planck Institute for the Science of Human History in Germany published their research in December in the journal *Nature*. Their findings show that the oldest beads came from East Africa, and likely spread south across the continent from that point.

"Based on what we're seeing, it looks like a single origin that spread out from that one region, sharing the same style," Miller tells CNN. "Possibly people would have seen this new thing that people were wearing or making and thought, 'Oh, that's so cool.' And then mimicked it."

The scientists conclude that the donut-shaped beads made from ostrich shells—an early form of personal adornment—were traded and copied by hunter-gather groups across Africa, reports Robin McKie for the *Guardian*.

Miller and Wang compared bead characteristics including total diameter, aperture diameter and shell thickness—across an 1,800-mile range dating from 50,000 to 33,000 years ago. The size and style of manufacture were nearly indistinguishable, suggesting a long-distance connection between the people of east and south Africa, according to Sarah Cascone of *Artnet News*.



Archaeologists say the ostrich bead trend continued for more than 20,000 years, and traveled more than 1,800 miles between groups of people in southern and eastern Africa.

"The result is surprising, but the pattern is clear," Wang says in the statement. "Throughout the 50,000 years we examined, this is the only time period that the bead characteristics are the same."

Ancient humans began wearing beads about 75,000 years ago as a way to express identity and define relationships, reports the *Guardian*. Scientists say the trend seems to have become increasingly popular about 50,000 years ago—the earliest date examined in the study.

"People made them to communicate symbolic messages, the way that today we might wear a wedding ring, to indicate something about social status, wealth, or position in society," Miller tells CNN.

The researchers studied the use of ostrich eggshells as beads to about 33,000 years ago, when the trend appears to have tapered off in the south, yet remained in the east, per *Artnet News*. The disruption may have occurred because of climate change.

According to the study, a major drought struck eastern Africa about that time, shifting the tropical rain belt to the south, possibly causing extensive flooding that interrupted communication between the two regions. Bead-making reappears in the regions in a different style about 19,000 years ago, per CNN.

"Through this combination of paleo-environmental proxies, climate models, and archaeological data, we can see the connection between climate change and cultural behavior," Wang tells *Tech Explorist*.

Miller and Wang say they were surprised by the results of their study after realizing that ancient civilizations had maintained connections over a large region of Africa long before modern transportation.

"It's kind of mind-boggling that these people, who lived 40,000 to 50,000 years ago, would have had some kind of social network that spread over such a long distance," Miller tells CNN.

"These tiny beads have the power to reveal big stories about our past," says Miller in the statement. "We encourage other researchers to build upon this database, and continue exploring evidence for cultural connection in new regions."

# Gem of the Month – Lepidolite

Lepidolite is the name of a rare lithium-rich mica mineral. This stone is found naturally in a variety of colors, mainly purple, pink, and red, but also gray and, rarely, yellow and colorless. Because lepidolite is lithium-bearing mica, it is often wrongly assumed that lithium is what causes the purple and pink hues that are so characteristic of this mineral. Instead, it is trace amounts of manganese that cause the colors.

Lepidolite has a complex chemical formula: potassium lithium aluminum silicate hydroxide fluoride  $\{K(Li,AI)_3(AI,Si,Rb)_4O_{10}(F,OH)_2\}$ . It is the most common lithium-bearing mineral and serves as a minor ore of lithium metal, with rubidium and cesium sometimes being byproducts.

Lepidolite can only form in geochemical environments where high concentrations of lithium are available for mineral formation. Lepidolite is a rare mineral because these geochemical situations rarely occur.

The lithium ion is very small, and it does not readily substitute in other minerals. As a result, it is usually one of the last ions to form minerals during the crystallization of a subsurface magma. As other ions are depleted, the residual fluids of magma crystallization become progressively enriched with lithium.

During the final stages of crystallization, there might finally be a high enough concentration of lithium present to form discrete lithium minerals such as spodumene, lepidolite, and petalite. Elbaite tourmaline is another lithium-bearing mineral that forms in association with lepidolite and other lithium minerals. Other associated minerals include beryl, cassiterite, cleavelandite, muscovite, quartz, topaz, and a variety of feldspar minerals.

Although prismatic-shaped lepidolite crystalline formations are sometimes available, most pieces are from mass deposits with a microcrystalline structure. Lepidolite splits in a vertical direction into thin leaves, or plates, due to its chemical makeup, forming what are sometimes called crystal or mica books because viewed from the side the plates look like pages.

This photo shows how lepidolite mica occurs in stacks of sheets, sometimes referred to as "books." It also shows a typical purplish pink color exhibited by the mineral, its perfect cleavage in one direction, and its pearly to vitreous luster.

Lepidolite as a mineral lacks the hardness and tenacity to be a good gem material. However, it is sometimes impregnated with quartz, and that gives it durability. Lepidolite impregnated with quartz makes an attractive purple to pink gemstone, but what makes these stones even more desirable are the bright flashes that occur when the mica cleavage surfaces reflect light. This material is used to produce cabochons, beads, tumbled stones, and ornamental items. They are usually sold **as "lepidolite" without giving the quartz proper credit** for its important job.

In the cabochon on the left, coarse flakes of purplish-pink lepidolite are completely impregnated by quartz to produce a cabochon that flashes brightly from the coarse flakes. (measures 26x43 millimeters and was mined in Brazil) The cabochon on the right contains microscopic-size flakes of lepidolite suspended in a translucent quartz. Just a few percent by volume of lepidolite is enough to impart a purplish pink color throughout this stone. (measures 19x32 millimeters and was mined in New Mexico)

Lepidolite is the stone of beauty and rejuvenation. It contains lithium to boost energy and shift moods. It combats anxiety, isolation, and hopelessness. Lepidolite is sometimes called the "peace stone" or "grandmother stone" because it is thought to have nurturing and calming properties (possibly due to the lithium content). Lepidolite is an excellent stone at clearing out blockages and nudging you towards a place where you can connect to your higher self.

Notable occurrences of lepidolite have been found in Minas Gerais, Brazil; Manitoba, Canada; Honshu, Japan; Madagascar; Ural Mountains, Russia; Skuleboda, Sweden; California, Maine, and New Mexico, United States; and Coolgardie, Western Australia.

Click on the Members Only section in the upper right corner and then click on the Bylaws box on the left side of the page that opens (you may need to temporarily disable your pop-up blocker since the PDF opens in a new window or tab). In the bylaws you can read about every position on the Board and decide which one best suits your abilities and your time. The following is a brief description of the duties of the Board positions:

**President (currently Barbara Rosen)** – Preside at all general and Board meetings; oversee committees; sign contracts with the Treasurer; **provide a president's column for the newsletter** 

**1st Vice President-Classes and Special Events** – Coordinate instructors and students for bead society-sponsored workshops; create brochures and flyers for workshops, when required; assist with special events in which BSNM participates

**2nd Vice President-Programs (currently Pat Verrelle) –** Plan and arrange programs for the general meetings and for each Bead Time session

**Treasurer (currently Liz Reisinger)** – Be custodian of all BSNM funds; keep an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements; submit a budget for Board discussion and approval; make payments in accordance with the budget upon receipt of receipts and completed reimbursement forms; prepare monthly financial reports; file taxes and renew business license

**Secretary (currently Helen Yackel)** – Record the proceedings of the Board meetings and the October general election meeting; send minutes to Board members in a timely fashion; conduct general correspondence of BSNM regarding business-related items

**Membership Chair (currently Deb Cole) –** Collect dues and distribute membership cards; collect monies for raffle tickets at general meetings; process online renewals for members and new members; maintain accuracy of Gmail and BSNM website databases of members

**Membership Recruiter –** Oversee and form a Welcome Committee; visit bead stores, shows, and events for the purpose of recruiting new members

**Newsletter Editor (currently Jill Bartel) –** Solicit, edit, and write articles for the Newsletter; maintain business member ads for publication; publish newsletter via email to all members **Volunteer Coordinator** – Coordinate volunteer recruitment and scheduling for events where BSNM has a table/booth or where the BSNM's assistance has been requested; ensure membership applications and business cards are available for these events

**Member-at-Large** – Be responsible for representing the suggestions and concerns of the general membership to the Board

**Webmaster (currently Amanda Archuleta) –** Manage the content posted on the BSNM website; maintain the technical contracts for website, including eCommerce, webhosting, and event coordination applications

**Social Media Manager –** Maintain the BSNM Facebook page and other social networking accounts; add BSNM events to Facebook page; monitor Facebook activity for messages, likes, and unauthorized links to commercial pages

**Meeting Coordinator (currently Liz Reisinger)** – Recruit volunteers to bring refreshments to the general meetings; set up and monitor the show-andtell tables; assist with setting up and taking down tables and chairs, if necessary; make sure there are paper plates, napkins, forks, etc., for each meeting

**Photographer (currently Julie Fear) –** Take photographs at meetings and events, including all contest entries and winners; provide photos to Webmaster, Social Media Manager, and Newsletter Editor for publication

**Historian** – Maintain speakers' records; keep "lessons learned" documentation (record classes taught, when, and by whom)

Please decide to run for office. You will be very instrumental in continuing the growth of the BSNM and making the necessary changes to stay relevant and helping us to stay on an upward trajectory. It is an honorable thing to sacrifice some time for something you care about and believe in and that benefits others.

*Mysterious Inner Worlds* is the first solo exhibition in New Mexico featuring Anila Quayyum Agha. The exhibition features four sculptures activated by light, including the large-scale light installation titled *Intersections* (2014) and the debut of the sculpture *Steel Garden (Red)* (2021), as well as two-dimensional pieces that include **beads**.

Agha combines forms from Islamic architecture with her own concepts about patterns of sacred and worldly spaces. Her work ranges in scale from monumental installations to intricate embroidered drawings. She is inspired by her personal experiences as a woman and an immigrant from Pakistan, arriving in the US just before September 2001, as well as her concerns about the environment. **Agha's work engages more broadly** with the dynamic and contradictory relationships among immigrant experiences as well as the intersectionality of gender, religion, labor, and social codes.




