October 7	How to Create a Multi-Strand Necklace Class		
	<ul> <li>Saturday, October 7, 2023 1:00pm to 3:00pm Heights Cumberland Presbyterian Church, 8600 Academy Rd. NE</li> <li>Anna Holland will teach how to finish a multi-strand necklace.</li> <li>Cost for the class is \$15. This includes two 3-inch pieces of 16-gauge sterling silver wire and 15 sterling silver twisted crimps.</li> <li>Students need to bring: <ul> <li>Your favorite stringing wire, enough for 7 strands of beads. Each strand of wire should be at least 20 inches long, depending on how long you want your finished necklace to be (you want to have 5 inches of wire on each end of the beaded sections). You should pre-string your 7 strands in order to save time in class.</li> <li>Clamps or tape to secure the strands you've strung.</li> <li>2 silver cones wide enough at the base to accommodate the 7 strands of your necklace</li> <li>Silver clasp</li> <li>2 pair of needle nose pliers</li> <li>Round nose pliers</li> <li>Crimping tool</li> </ul> </li> <li>To make it easy, the beads you're stringing should be 6mm to 8mm. Again, you'll need enough of those beads to string 7 strands. Anna will have some beads with her if you can't find the right size. If you're working on a particular project and the beads are larger, that's ok. Anna will have what you'll need to make the adjustment.</li> <li>Sign up on the BSNM website: www.beadsocietynm.org. # Fall Colors 2023 Bead Challenge

The colors of fall may be bright (such as the red, orange, and yellow leaves on trees) or muted (such as the browns, greys, and deep purples of the forest as it gets ready for winter). Choose a color palette that illustrates your vision of fall colors and create a beaded object (jewelry or non-jewelry). There is no kit for this challenge.

#### **Rules:**

- **1.** All submissions must be completed by you prior to the October 17, 2023 BSNM general meeting (and made after the October 2022 general meeting).
- You may create a piece/set of jewelry (such as necklace, earrings, and/or bracelet) or a non-jewelry/mixed-media item (such as a decorated pumpkin, figurine, box, or wall hanging) for this challenge. (Only one entry in one category per person.)
- **3.** At least 25% of the finished project must be beads and/or jewelry elements (beads; cabochons; rhinestones; chain; old earrings, pendants, charms; etc.) incorporated into the design.
- **4.** You may add any elements such as paint, decoupage, and/or found objects you need to complete your project.
- 5. Your finished project must be brought to the October 2023 general meeting where members will vote and prizes will be awarded. There will be two categories for entries: jewelry and non-jewelry.
- 6. Judging will be based on creativity in presentation and materials, and mastery in craftsmanship. Judging will also be based in part on how closely the entries followed the rules. Prizes will be awarded!

Happy beading and good luck with the challenge! Try to use this challenge to broaden your beading horizons. Learn something new or try something different!

## **BSNM 2024 Elections**

The October elections are here. All positions on the 2024 Board are open for anyone who wants to run. It would be wonderful if people would shadow the current officers and learn on the go before taking over.

Without your contributions of time and energy, the bead society as we know it will cease to exist: **as a 501(3)(c) non-profit organization, we are required by law to have at least a president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer on our Board**. Without these four essential offices, the Bead Society of New Mexico will be forced to give up its non-profit **status and become a "hobby club," which includes** paying taxes at the state and federal level.

For the current version of the bylaws, which contains the complete duties of the officers, go to <u>www.beadsocietynm.org</u> and log in to the website (you **may need to register first if you haven't done so** before). Click on the Members Only section in the upper right corner and then click on the Bylaws box on the left side of the page that opens (you may need to temporarily disable your pop-up blocker since the PDF opens in a new window or tab). In the bylaws you can read about every position on the Board and decide which one best suits your abilities and your time. The following is a brief description of the duties of the Board positions:

**President (currently Barbara Rosen)** – Preside at all general and Board meetings; oversee committees; sign contracts with the Treasurer; provide a president's column for the newsletter

**1st Vice President-Classes and Special Events** – Coordinate instructors and students for bead society-sponsored workshops; create brochures and flyers for workshops, when required; assist with special events in which BSNM participates

**2nd Vice President-Programs (currently Pat Verrelle) –** Plan and arrange programs for the general meetings and for each Bead Time session

**Treasurer (currently Deb Cole)** – Be custodian of all BSNM funds; keep an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements; submit a budget for Board discussion and approval; make payments in accordance with the budget upon receipt of receipts and completed reimbursement forms; prepare monthly financial reports; file taxes and renew business license

**Secretary (currently Helen Yackel) –** Record the proceedings of the Board meetings and the October general election meeting; send minutes to Board members in a timely fashion; conduct general correspondence of BSNM regarding business-related items

**Membership Chair (currently Deb Cole and Barbara Rosen) –** Collect dues and distribute membership cards; collect monies for raffle tickets at general meetings; process online renewals for members and new members; maintain accuracy of Gmail and BSNM website databases of members

**Membership Recruiter** – Oversee and form a Welcome Committee; visit bead stores, shows, and events for the purpose of recruiting new members

**Newsletter Editor (currently Jill Bartel) –** Solicit, edit, and write articles for the Newsletter; maintain business member ads for publication; publish newsletter via email to all members

**Volunteer Coordinator** – Coordinate volunteer recruitment and scheduling for events where BSNM has a table/booth or where the BSNM's assistance has been requested; ensure membership applications and business cards are available for these events

**Member-at-Large (currently Laurye Tanner) –** Be responsible for representing the suggestions and concerns of the general membership to the Board

**Webmaster (currently Amanda Archuleta) –** Manage the content posted on the BSNM website; maintain the technical contracts for website, including eCommerce, webhosting, and event coordination applications

**Social Media Manager –** Maintain the BSNM Facebook page and other social networking accounts; add BSNM events to Facebook page; monitor Facebook activity for messages, likes, and unauthorized links to commercial pages

**Meeting Coordinator (currently Claudette Jaramillo)** – Recruit volunteers to bring refreshments to the general meetings; set up and monitor the show-and-tell tables; assist with setting up and taking down tables and chairs, if necessary; make sure there are paper plates, napkins, forks, etc., for each meeting

**Photographer (currently Pam Troutman) –** Take photographs at meetings and events, including all contest entries and winners; provide photos to Webmaster, Social Media Manager, and Newsletter Editor for publication

**Historian** – Maintain speakers' records; keep "lessons learned" documentation (record classes taught, when, and by whom)

Please decide to run for office. You will be very instrumental in continuing the growth of the BSNM and making the necessary changes to stay relevant and helping us to stay on an upward trajectory. It is an honorable thing to sacrifice some time for something you care about and believe in and that benefits others.

## **Beaded Cane**

Kristian Chee entered a peyote beaded cane in the Jewelry-Beadwork competition at the 2023 New Mexico State Fair (and won a blue ribbon). BSNM members who were there when Kristian brought the cane in were very excited. She's an amazing young person and artist, and sent us the following information about the cane she made:





I was inspired to do this cane as a tribute to my grandfather who passed away in July 2021. He was my best friend and one of the strongest men I've known. His beaded cane was the last one I ever beaded.

This cane has the words, "Hozho nahasdlii," which comes from the Navajo blessing meaning, "It has become beauty again." Every color and design has some form of meaning and protection. The eagle feathers are precious to Native community because they belong to the one bird that can soar high enough into the sky and not grow tired. They carry your prayers to the other world. The Navajo Basket is like a map that the Navajo chart their lives. The existence of good (red color) and bad (black). The bear paw is a representation of the Ho-Chunk tribe, a tribute to the strength that we receive from our Bear clan. It sits towards the base of the cane to symbolize the strength it needs to walk this Earth.

This cane is a reminder of where I come from and how far I have come since my Grandfather passed away. He was my best friend. We shared a love of creating art, my canvases were beads and his was paint and pottery. When he died, I lost my biggest supporter, so beading this cane was for him. I know when I finished he was saying, "Atta Girl. That's how you do it."

**Measurements:** 4 inches around x 33 inches long with 52 columns and 404 rows of beads.

**Beads:** total of 21,008 size 11 seed beads in 12 colors (purchased from Thunderbird Bead Supply, Hobby Lobby, and The Beaded Iris): Galvanized Silver, Silver-Lined Crystal, Silver-Lined Orange, Silver-Lined Gray, Blue-Lined Crystal, Opaque Vermillion Red AB, Opaque Yellow, Opaque White, Light Caramel Ceylon. Opaque Matte Black. Opaque Red, and Dyed Opaque Maroon

Time to Make: 96 hours 2 minutes

# **Stone Bead Hole Sizes**

More than ever we've been receiving questions about the size of our stone bead holes. As more and more stringing materials are being made and used in jewelry designs, the more challenges have been popping up as well. Bead holes come in a wide variety of sizes and are made for a variety of reasons. For example, glass beads have a very consistent hole because the beads are made from molds. Freshwater pearls have a very small hole normally, and raw diamond beads have the tiniest hole in the bead world.

#### **Difficulties with Gemstone Beads**

Then there comes the difficulty with consistency with gemstone beads. When you venture into natural materials such as stone, drilling them has many challenges. For example, the chosen stone material may be fragile in structure and will only allow for a small hole, so as not to crack the material. The larger the hole, the bigger possibility that the bead will break. When creating large-hole beads, breakage and loss is inevitable because of the inconsistencies.

Some stones need to be drilled from either end into the center where they meet. This insures that the hole is centered but can lead to an uneven hole diameter. To combat this challenge, it is best to keep on hand a variety of stringing materials so you will never have to run to the store to complete a design!

#### Here are some stringing material sizes to try:

**.014 diameter beading wire** works great for glass, wood, seeds, and medium- to large-sized stone beads. Glass, wood, and seed beads are made with molds so their holes and shapes are consistent, making smaller holes easier to insert. Stone beads with small holes are also easier to make because there is a smaller chance of the gemstone breaking during the process.

**.010 diameter beading wire** works well for pearls and small stone beads. Freshwater pearls will always have small holes because they are very delicate. Stones like diamonds, while very hard, are still delicate as well.

#### **Hole Drilling Techniques**

There are multiple ways to drill stone. The best method (and the one we use for large-hole beads at Dakota Stones) uses ultrasonic technology. Ultrasonic drilling gives the cleanest possible hole edges, minimizing potential abrasion and damage to stringing material. It also gives a consistent hole through the entire bead, eliminating the frustrating, and often impassable, narrowing in the middle of the bead that can result from poorly executed traditional drilling methods.

# **The Nature of Glass Exhibit**

#### New Mexico Museum of Art, 107 W. Palace Ave., Santa Fe through December 31, 2023

"The Nature of Glass" exhibit focuses on 28 contemporary works by such household names as Judy Chicago, Georgia O'Keefe, and Preston Singletary, as well as William Morris, Robert Wilson, and Tony Jojola.

The featured techniques include blown, hot-wired, etched, assemblage, sand carved, cast, kiln-formed, stained, and more. Most of the works reflect nature or the environment via images of flora and fauna, as well as the human body, said curator Christian Waguespack.

"This looks at how [artists] brought nature into their work through the representation of flowers, animals, the body, space, science, and the environment," Waguespack said. "It's pretty broad."

Glass has been used as an artistic medium for thousands of years and remains one of the world's most prevalent art forms.

"Glass is becoming more and more popular in New Mexico," Waguespack said. "We've got several glass studios in Santa Fe. Even [famed glass artist Dale] Chihuly taught at the Institute of Indian Arts and Culture. It's definitely got a presence here and a big, strong following."

**B104**: Beaded entries featuring beads NOT made by the artist.

**B105**: Beaded non-jewelry (home décor and clothing) items (beads must comprise 50% of the Item)

**B106**: Metal jewelry items including chain mail and wire work (wire/metal must comprise 50% of the item

#### The second annual Museum of Beadwork Challenge is open to submissions!

This challenge is once again being co-sponsored by Miyuki Co., Ltd., and Caravan Beads, and the Museum of Beadwork (MOB) is very grateful for their support. In addition to prizes, selected entries will be part of an exhibition in 2024.

#### **Challenge Details**

The MOB Challenge will have 5 categories:

- Sculpture Free standing 3-dimensional pieces.
- **Tapestry** Hanging/wall pieces, or framed work, generally 2-dimensional.
- **Clothing** Embroidered or constructed garments.
- Accessories Purses, shoes, masks, etc.
- **Jewelry** Body adornment other than clothing or accessory items.

#### **Requirements:**

All entries must evoke the challenge theme for this year: **A Novel Tea: A Spot of Beads and Whimsy** 

This year's theme is tea parties; from realistic representations to the delightfully unconventional, inspired by literature, film, fantasy, or any other tea party-infused ideas you can envision. The Museum of Beadwork's staff are avid readers and hobby historians, and honestly, who doesn't love a tea party? So come have a spot, brew up an idea, and pour out your imagination (with one lump or two)!

- One entry per person. Entries must be made by a single person; no group entries allowed.
- All entries must be of original design: winning designs from any other contests may not be submitted.
- Any beading technique or combination of techniques may be used.
- All entries must be comprised primarily of Miyuki beads (70% or higher). This does not include things like armature, support, substrate, etc. Any Miyuki beads are acceptable, not just Delica beads. If you are unsure about the beads you have, contact your supplier for help.
- This is an international competition; entries from all countries are encouraged.
- There is no size limitation for this competition. Just remember that if your entry is chosen you will be expected to cover the shipping to and from Portland, Maine.
- The initial judging is based on digital images. Each entry can submit up to 10 images. Do not mail your actual beadwork to us until instructed to do so.
- The selected entrants from the initial round will be required to send in or deliver their completed pieces in order to be considered for the final judging.
- If your entry requires special display fixtures you are expected to send those as well, along with clear and simple instructions for display. If you have questions about special display needs, please contact us directly. (This does not include typical neck forms or mannequins. Feel free to inquire with questions before shipping).
- Selected entries will be on exhibit for a 1-year show in the Museum of Beadwork gallery.
- All applications, entrance fees, and photos must be received no later than midnight on March 15th, 2024. Entry fee is \$30, payable through the MOB website. Late submissions will not be considered.

- Only entries that make it to the second round of judging will be exhibited.
- Exhibition dates will be from June 1st, 2024 to May 31st, 2025.
- Artists will be responsible for all shipping to and from the Museum of Beadwork.
- Voting for the People's Choice category will take place from the opening of the exhibit until June 29th, 2024. Your piece must physically be on display to qualify.



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
